## One hour's walk around New York

Using the SAS Ticket Office (J7) as a reference point, walk south on Fifth Avenue to the promenade through Rockefeller Center (between 49th and 50th Streets). Walk around the Sunken Plaza and then west on 49th Street to Seventh Avenue (J6). Turn left and walk along Seventh Avenue until Broadway crosses from the west. Follow Broadway as far as 42nd Street. (This area, at the junction of Broadway and Seventh Avenue is Times Square.) Turn left into 42nd Street and continue to Vanderbilt Avenue (J8). On the way you will pass the Central Public Library on the southwest corner of Fifth Avenue and 42nd Street. (At 42nd Street and Vanderbilt Avenue you might be interested in taking a moment to look into Grand Central Station.) Turn left into Vanderbilt Avenue and continue to 46th Street. Here you have two choices: one block to the right is Park Avenue with the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, the Byzantine St. Bartholomew's Church and sparkling new office buildings; one block to your left is Madison Avenue with smart shops. Choose whichever you prefer and walk to 51st Street. Here a left turn will bring you, after a few minutes walk, past St. Patrick's Cathedral and back to your starting point.
